On January 1st, 1863, President Abraham Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation declaring "that all persons held as slaves" within rebel states "are, and henceforward shall be free." With the stroke of his pen, more than 3.5 million enslaved people in the secessionist South gained their freedom. This proclamation of independence was mostly symbolic with true freedom from bondage happening over two and a half years following the surrender at Appomattox in April of 1865.

On May 10, 1865, United States Brigadier General Edward M. McCook arrived in Tallahassee, Florida to take possession of the city from Confederate Forces. 10 days later, on May 20th, the Emancipation Proclamation was officially declared in effect, with an announcement sent by Major General Quincy A. Gilmore declaring that "the people of the black race are free citizens of the United States." News spread fast of this freedom, quickly making its way to Thomasville. Thousands of African Americans held in bondage were finally free. One month later on June 19, 1865, federal troops led by General Gordon Grange arrived in Galveston, Texas to enforce the Emancipation Proclamation.

This day later became known as Juneteenth, to commemorate the last enslaved African Americans in the United States finally receiving freedom. For decades, Juneteenth was celebrated primarily with African American communities, with public readings of the Emancipation Proclamation, music, cookouts, and more. In Thomasville, emancipation celebrations for May 20th were important to the African American community, with many celebrations on local plantations like Pebble Hill.

As early as the mid-1990s, advocates have pushed for Juneteenth to become a federal holiday, but it officially earned that status in June 2021 after being signed into law by President Joe Biden. This push for national recognition stemmed from the global Black Lives Matter protests of the summer of 2020 following the murder of George Floyd.

Today we honor and celebrate Juneteenth as a symbol of resilience and a testament to the enduring spirit of those who have fought, died, and dreamed for freedom. As we celebrate this holiday, we must reflect on our progress and the work that remains. Our country is plagued by systemic racism, legacies of slavery & oppression, challenges to truthful education, and blatant attacks against our rights. Now more than ever, we must commit ourselves to the ideals of justice, equality, and freedom for all.
